MOST of us visited N'awlins because of its music — whether it was for a special event such as Jazz Festival, Ponderosa Stomp or Mardi Gras, or just any old night. Once there, we fell in love with its people and rich cultural life. We're all heartbroken at the reality of the city in ruins and its thousands of displaced flood victims.

Here are some musical ways to aid hurricane relief efforts and also to sup-

(Sept. 17): Jazz at Lincoln Center's star-studded telethon (at the Frederick P. Rose Theater) includes such luminaries such as **Wynton Marsalis, Paul Simon, Elvis Costello, Norah Jones and Buckwheat Zydeco.**

Tickets (\$50 to \$10,000) are on sale now at the box office (Broadway at 60th St.), or through Center-Charge at (212) 721-6500 and jalc.org. PBS will broadcast it live.

UPCOMING SUNDAYS: Joe's Pub (425 Lafayette St.; [212] 539-8770) will feature two of NOLA's own displaced musicians with proceeds going to the Grammy's **MusiCares** (grammy.com/musicares).

On Sept. 18 and 25, pianist, singer and songwriter **Allen Toussaint** — he wrote tunes such as Ernie K-Doe's "Mother-in-Law" and "Southern Nights" (a Glen Campbell hit) — will perform an intimate benefit brunch show (\$30).

On Sept. 18: New Orleans native and jazz trumpeter **Terence Blanchard** hit's Joe's (\$20).

More music and information:

■ For those of you who want to listen to the sounds that helped put the Big Easy into our hearts, check out WFUV (90.7 FM) at 5 to 7 p.m. on Sunday for a special edition of Nick Spitzer's "American Routes" program.

Spitzer, whose studio is located in the French Quarter, is broadcasting from Lafayette, La. and will celebrate New Orleans history and culture through stories and songs (americanroutes.org).

■ Listen up and buy "Doctors, Professors, Kings & Queens: The Big Ol' Box of New Orleans." This extensive four-disc elegant box set with 80 hits from Crescent City musical legends captures the city's multiple musical stylings. Shout! Factory will donate profits from sales through its Web site (shoutfactory.com) to the American Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund.

■ **The New Orleans Musicians' Clinic** (wwoz.com/clinic): This organization provides free health care to musicians and has relocated to Lafayette, La., where the workers are locating local

musicians and finding them shelter.
